MAP YOUR VILLAGE

- 1. Begin by drawing the area where you live. You can do this from memory, or perhaps ask an adult to go on a walk with you, if you need reminding.
- 2. Be sure to mark any important places on your map a friend's house, a favourite shop, the spot where something funny happened.
- 3. Include any people you know in your neighbourhood the lady next door, the new baby across the street, the shopkeeper who makes you laugh.
- 4. Around the edges, you could add important people who might be further away. After all, they are part of your 'village' too!

village so that the children who lived there didn't have to walk a long way to get to their classes.
